EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT

Once again, the continuation of COVID-19 across the globe saw great challenges around restrictions, guidelines and operations for sport in SA which impacted the structure of fixtures along with mid-season lockdown. Fixturing in general is difficult without the number of changes that occur last minute or throughout the competition due to team withdrawals or grade/division changes. It is important that team nominations remain unchanged once deadlines are reached and fixtures are complete to reduce the impact of the competitions moving forward as sometimes there is no way to fix them once they have started. Having reviewed the fixtures on many occasions I will be recommending changes to the times of games to make it more seamless for participants and Clubs.

Our field availability and conditions are problematic with several Clubs not having access to grounds this year, or who were adversely affected by inclement weather conditions or other unavoidable circumstances during the season. It is imperative that we strengthen our relationships with councils to ensure we can maximise playing opportunities for lacrosse. As a small sport we tend to accept playing on ground conditions that are far from acceptable for a lot of sports and regular communication with your councils will enable us to promote our sport in the same way as watching AFL at Adelaide Oval. I understand that we are hamstrung by lease agreements and co-sharing with other sports, however we need to find a solution that can allow our sport to continue to play all year round.

LSA has been working with Lacrosse Australia (LA) to deliver the coach education and development framework to continue to grow the number and quality of coaches to ensure participants, players and athletes receive the best coaching, teaching and experience within lacrosse no matter what level of competition or experience. This Coaching Framework provides in-depth details regarding the different education opportunities; their purpose, curriculum, assessment requirements, current pathway and how the accreditation level links back to the LA Participation Framework. The LA Coaching Framework is underpinned and linked directly to the LA Participation Framework. The LA Participation Framework utilises the Foundations, Talent, Elite & Mastery (FTEM) framework which has been endorsed by Sport Australia and widely adopted by other National Sporting Organisations. Each phase for the FTEM Model is critical to the development and growth of a participant, player or athlete. The Coach Education and Development courses will be mandatory and rolled out in 2022 for all coaches participating at National Championships/Tournaments. LSA will be heavily promoting these opportunities to Club coaches in the first quarter of 2022.

Earlier in the year I was invited to participate in the project reference group by LA to assist in undertaking a research project to help guide the development of a "whole of sport" plan designed to grow Lacrosse membership and participation across the country in a coordinated and efficient way. LA is invited and encouraged all lacrosse stakeholders: players, parents, coaches, officials, administrators and other volunteers/members (current or recently non-returning), to provide input into the development of the strategy via the completion of a short e-Survey. The survey was the first element of our consultation phase for the project. Following the completion and review of results, LA in conjunction with McLaughlin Sports Consultancy has conducted three more consultation elements including:

- Up to 30 interviews with identified stakeholders ranging from players, officials, coaches and administrators from all levels and geographical locations.
- Following the interviews, a focus group webinar was held with Member Associations', invited representatives, and,
- The final and fourth consultation element was a I day meeting with LA, MAs and other key stakeholders to further discuss the findings, themes and opportunities from the consultation phase.

A Draft Lacrosse in Australia Participation and Engagement Strategy 2022-2024 will be released late November, which will be built on all insights collected and will look to address and optimize key Drivers of Participation Growth identified by Sport Australia, as they relate to Lacrosse.

This was a challenging season for all Clubs, volunteers, officials, referees and players, they all lived up to the spirit of Lacrosse, produced some outstanding contributions and strengthened our game. On behalf of the Board, I thank you all and congratulate you on continuing to build SA into a strong and vibrant Lacrosse Community. Along with Club Committee members, I am extremely grateful to everyone who contributes at our Clubs week after week, including the coaches, managers, trainers, line markers, canteen and bar staff — the entire Club team. You are the essence of our sport.

GIULIA MARION, EXECUTIVE OFFICER

On behalf of the Lacrosse South Australia Association Board it is my pleasure to present the 2021 Annual Report and this Presidents Report.

Unfortunately, 2021 continued to prove to be difficult for all Australians as the Covid 19 pandemic and the delta strain continued to place restriction and impacted our daily lives. Despite these challenges the association members of Lacrosse South Australia have shown fortitude in the face of adversity I would like to thank everyone for the support that they have provided this year.

When I first elected to the LSA board in 2018, I was made aware that there had been ongoing efforts by a small and dedicated group of individuals to update the Constitution since 2014/2015. It was therefore a personnel highlight at the 2020 AGM to have a unanimous vote to change the LSA constitution. This will continue to be a work in progress as the Bylaws and other instruments that govern our sport are updated to be aligned and consistent with the change in the way the Constitution operates.

With the change in the Constitution to maintain a consistent turnover and retention of Board members. Stephen Mortimer and Martin Baker continued their 2 years terms having been elected at the 2019 AGM and Addie Cunningham, Tim Dickson and Sue Hogan were elected at the 2020 AGM. This constituted a full board of elected members. The two appointed Board positions were then filled by Tim Guyatt and myself. At the first Board meeting Tim Dickson was elected to the role of President of LSA. Unfortunately, Tim Dickson advised the Board in early 2021 that he was unable to continue as a Board member and submitted his resignation. To maintain continuity the Board accept myself as a replacement for the elected position and the role of President. In mid-2021 Craig Schicker was approached and accepted a appointed positions on the Board. Therefore, the Board has been able to close out 2021 with a full Board in accordance with the Constitution.

Unfortunately, 2021 continued from where 2020 left off in terms of Covid 19. At a state level we were very fortunate to have very few lockdowns and disruptions and this result in being able to complete a full season for most grades resulting in a fantastic final series at Norwood oval.

However, at a national level Lacrosse Victoria (LV) was significantly impacted and was unable to have a season in 2021. Lacrosse Western Australia (LWA) like South Australia remained largely free of lockdowns. However, with the tight restrictions put in place by the respective state governments Lacrosse Australia (LA) has been unable to run any form of national championship or tournament for another year. LSA is in regular conversations with LA, LV, LWA in and attempt to provide some level of high-performance competition to assist our national squads with opportunities to hone their skills for when the International championships are held.

As we look to the future one aspect that the Board recognises that needs to be reviewed and update is the Strategic Plan. This will involve all members of the Association reflecting and provide feedback on what has worked well, what hasn't, what are we doing that maybe we should stop and what can be improved. As a small but very passionate sport we are fortunate to have groups of dedicated volunteers. Further we are fortunate to have a number of International level players and Coaches all who understand the pride that comes from representing your country. It is important that we have a clear plan and strategy of what we want to achieve so that this effort can be best directed and use in the most efficient and constructive way and provide our youth with the same opportunities that have existed in the past. To this end I would ask all Association members to consider and put effort into this task and provide feedback to the Board.

Finally, I would like to recognise our staff of Giulia, Jarrod, Trish and Marilyn for their continued efforts in what has been another challenging year. In particular I would like to acknowledge Giulia. At the commencement of each season Giulia undertakes the thankless and enormously frustrating task to trying to lock down the fixtures. In the lead up to the first games it is not uncommon for the fixture to have change a dozen times as there is a delicate balance between fluctuating team nominations, juniors playing in multiple grades as well as seniors, official who are also players and field availability. This is invariable mixed with player clearance wanting to be processed, player registration being completed at the last minute and a multitude of other things that need to be completed. I commend her for her tenacity in navigating this period each year.

DIRECTOR, ADMININISTRATION/FINANCE REPORT

This is my first year on the Board as Director, Administration which provided insight to the volume of work required to make sure LSA office and Board are providing a service to its affiliated clubs.

My main duties were contributing to decisions of the board and also taking the minutes; logging receipt of scoresheets.

Logging of scoresheets was very challenging and time rich for the following reasons:

- not filled in properly (eg date, round, which club submitted the scoresheet was not filled in, scores not tallied)
- some clubs did not send in their scoresheets on a regular basis and this put pressure on myself and the office in entering data on best players, umpire/referee votes. Therefore, a lot of time was spent chasing up scoresheets in readiness for LSA senior presentation.

If submitted on a weekly basis as a volunteer I could manage my time on a weekly basis, some weeks I spent the weekend sorting and logging scoresheets and preparing missing lists.

Next season clubs will receive a weekly reminder of scoresheets missing and fines will apply if not submitted as per bylaws.

WOMEN'S COMPETITION COMMITTEE REPORT

The Women's Competition committee met on Zoom prior to the season as well as where needed during the season. Updates were provided via email and Facebook to the larger group as well as directly to clubs involved where necessary.

2021 Review for WCC:

6V6 COMPETITION - North and South competitions- 2x Brighton teams, Glenelg, Blue Warriors, North Eagles, Wilderness and Burnside-Competitions were held separately in the lead up to 'finals' where we saw both sides of competition compete on the final day! Glenelg were named the champions of the 6v6 competition after a close game with Brighton. Overall a great step towards implementation of 6v6 in our local game.

REGULAR SEASON - Thank you everyone for your support in getting the 2021 season up and running! WSL continued to play their competition on Friday nights with a rotating fixture- specific thanks to Glenelg, Brighton & North Adelaide (who hosted more games than intended due to a windstorm in July which saw Brighton lose their back fence). WDI & WD2 had a different format to their fixture with WD2 starting the season with the early game at 1:30 and WDI starting their games at 3:00 which as per requested from the WCC had a switch halfway through the season to these start times. The WCC believed this was a great initiative to get UI8 players to stick around to play WDI or WD2- this equal split of start times was well received by the teams. Unfortunately, COVID-19 struck again affecting 2 rounds- I would like to highlight the large amount of work that Giulia and the LSA office put in to accommodate more rounds where possible. WSL were able to make up games on Monday nights at NALC and did not miss any games! It was also fantastic to be back at Norwood for finals and have quite a spectacle made of the day for all those involved.

The Men's Competition Committee met from December 2020 to November 2021 with the main topics of discussion being:

- State League, Div I and Div 2 schedules
- Open communication between ALRA & MCC
- Partnership with Cascade/Maverik
- Support SA Indoor Lacrosse League
 - LSA owned asset
 - Increase marketing/awareness
 - Administrational & financial support as required

Year in review:

In my 4th year as MC Director, we saw the role out of the 1st 6v6 tournament. The field season fortunately only had a 2-week impact from CVD-19 and we saw the return to Norwood for finals hosting.

MCC on socials - Getting more engagement with the MCC, we continue with the Facebook page and messenger group. This allows us to communicate more regularly, reducing the need for face-to-face meetings, as most items could be discussed & voted on via these platforms.

SAILL — The 2020/21 season continued to see a 5-team competition, continuing to increase media presence, spectator entertainment and live streaming via LSATV. We trailed a few games at AFL-max on a Thursday night, which was a great experience and something a bit different. The finals series again saw some of the best Lacrosse I've watched.

<u>6v6 tournament</u> — The world Lacrosse format had mixed reviews, but as a 1st year for players and officials, the tournament went as smooth as it could as everyone learned the new form of the game and its differences. We are looking to expand on this in 2022.

Field season - Specific thanks to the entire community again. Thankfully CVD-19 only impacted 2 rounds and we saw the return of ETP to the men's SL. No rule changes besides a technical change to the face-off, which took a bit of getting use to by all parties, but fully implemented by finals. Semi-finals were held at Woodville, a great day and venue to host such a day. Great Lacrosse and all fields fully utilised, one of my favourite days of the year. The Preliminary and Grand Finals we were back at Norwood, a special thanks for those that volunteered and coordinated that. IN 2022 we will be looking into whether MD2 can be split into 2 divisions, separating out the development vs. social aspect of it.

Looking forward:

I'm excited for 2022. To continue the hard work that has been done by the LSA & the MCC. Continue to tweak the current beliefs, structures, and backbone of our game to refresh and accelerate the sport into what I think is a positive looking future.

DEVELOPMENT COORDINATOR REPORT

2021 Was a Challenging year for development in Lacrosse Due to Covid Restrictions but I'm Happy to say we managed to run 5 Carnivals. This includes:

SCHOOLS CARNIVALS

- Western School Carnival at Glenelg LC 310 students, 39 teams from 5 schools.
- Southern School Carnival at Sturt LC, 220 students, 27 teams from 5 schools.
- Southern School Carnival at Brighton LC, 270 students, 33 teams from 5 schools.
- Northern SAPSASA Carnival at North Adelaide LC, 240 students, 30 teams from 4 schools.
- Northern School Carnival at Ardtornish school this was a small 2 school carnival but it was really well received and supported by 150 students.

These events are significant in promoting lacrosse to a broad school base -building on clinic work and encouraging participation.

CATHOLIC SCHOOLS CARNIVALS This year Lacrosse was a 4 Day carnival with one of the days being postponed until the end of November due to bad weather. But with all 4 days we have a total of 180 teams from 36 schools with 1440 kids playing Lacrosse which was a huge success. This is a permanent fixture on the Catholic Sports Calendar, therefore providing a regular competition event for all Catholic schools making for ongoing development/Recruiting opportunities.

The ACHPER PE week Carnivals will have 10 schools involved this helps with not only introducing Lacrosse to the children but it's a chance to build relationships with PE teachers and follow up with clinics.

Tea Tree Gully SAPSASA sporting carnival was rained out on the first day but we did manage to see children from 8 schools on day 2 being Introduced to Lacrosse and I have already set up clinics in 3 new schools for next year.

My thanks also go out to the Board of SALO (South Australian Lacrosse Officials) who have put in place the building blocks to bring both the Women's and Men's Officiating under one banner within South Australia.

No National or International activities to report on but there is a glimmer of light for early 2022.

As for the 2021 season, we had some rule changes which were skillfully managed into the game. Mark Polden was tasked by World Lacrosse to produce a new working mechanic around the "Face off" of the men's game, hopefully this will be adopted.

Overall, I believe a successful season was achieved.

We have still got issues with a minority of the lacrosse fraternity who think that it is OK to abuse Officials. I hope everyone continues to speak out and not let this continue. We have all got our part to play.

2022 will bring its challenges with the promise of new rules and a push to get the "Sixes" game to be played alongside our traditional field format. We can only succeed in producing a great competition if clubs provide the officials. We need officials to be ready to go at the start of the season and this includes all the relevant tasks to be completed, e.g., exams to be passed, attendance at the relevant preseason training and completion of registration forms. I would like to think during the conversations of who is available to play in the coming season the same would be said for officials. It is an obligation that when entering a team to play in any grade, an official is named on the application paperwork, and in my view, this has not been complied with if the named person has not completed or at the very least in the process of completing the required tasks.

LSA TV will also be looking to work with officials and coaches to develop a series of educational videos that will support coaches and officials in developing their craft and supporting growth of the game.


We are further looking to build our partnerships with current and future sponsors and have a few things 'brewing' away and look to launch them in 2022.


